# Gaudete, Laetare, and RoseColored Paraments/Vestments

Jesus said "when you fast, do not look gloomy like the hypocrites...when you fast, anoint your head and wash your face" (Matthew 6:16, 17). The custom of fasting has long been a part of religious life.

The Christian Church has two seasons in particular where fasting is a presumed part of the observance of the season. The Church Year has two supreme feasts: the Feast of the Nativity of Our Lord (Christmas) and the Feast of the Resurrection of our Lord (Easter). Each of these high holy feasts has a season of preparation: Advent in preparation for Christmas and Lent in preparation for Easter. These preparatory seasons

are penitential in nature—that is, a major part of their focus is on repentance and our unworthiness to receive our Lord's gifts which He gives in and through the major



events of our Savior's life and ministry which we celebrate on the feasts of Christmas and Easter. Part of the observance of the penitential nature of the seasons is the practice of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. (The focus on prayer is why we add 'extra' midweek services to our life together during Advent and Lent. Likewise, the more

recent custom of having soup-suppers is tied to fasting; the simple meal of soup is a way for us to fast together.)

The historic Church realized that four weeks (Advent) and six weeks (Lent) is a long time for a rigorous fast, and so, there are built into each of the penitential seasons a 'break' a 'lightening' of the fast. The third Sunday in Advent (Gaudete) and the fourth Sunday in Lent (Laetare) are days which are set aside as a 'lightening' of the fast—a sort of 'break' or 'breather' before returning to the final push of rigorous fasting leading up to the high, holy feasts. Their names (Gaudete and Laetare) come from the Latin words which begin the introits for the day. In English, we render both words "rejoice." So Gaudete and Laetare are each a day of subdued (it is still a penitential season, after all) rejoicing in the midst of the preparatory, penitential fast.

So why rose? The liturgical color for Lent and—at various times and places—Advent (blue or violet for Advent is a discussion for another time) is violet. The color of violet is achieved by mixing black and red. When the black is removed



from the violet, the result is rose. (This is, of course, symbolism and not a strict physics of light and color.) So the rose paraments and vestments are a way to express visually the lightening of the

penitential fast on Gaudete and Laetare. (Even many churches which *don't* have rose paraments and vestments *do* have a rose candle in their Advent wreath for the third Sunday in Advent.)

All of these themes are more pronounced in the readings and various propers which are appointed in the older one-year lectionary, but vestiges of these themes remain even in the newer three-year lectionary.

In Advent, and Lent, when you see the rose-colored paraments and vestments, take a breather. Relax the fast. Know that the feast for which you are preparing is near. And most of all, rejoice. Rejoice that the incarnation and birth of Jesus and the death and resurrection of Jesus mean that you are forgiven for all your sins.

# The Ceremonies of Passiontide

The final stage in our symbolic journey toward Easter (the journey which began back on *Septuagesima*) is Passiontide, which begins with *Judica*, the fifth Sunday in Lent. Passiontide is the 'home stretch,' the final push and most rigorous portion of the Lenten fast. This is why *Laetare*, the fourth Sunday in Lent has a slightly different character. (See the explanation of *Laetare* and the rose color in another article in this newsletter.) During Passiontide, the crucifixes and crosses are now covered, triptychs are closed (in churches which employ triptychs), and even the *Gloria Patri* disappears for a while.

A common question about Passiontide is "Why in the world would we drape and cover the crucifixes and crosses as we get closer to Good Friday, as our attention upon the last hours and the sufferings of our Lord increases?"

We do this because we don't deserve to look upon the crucifix. We are not worthy of the Sacrifice. Christ on the cross is our greatest and most cherished symbol. So it is partially taken away from us for a short time, that we might better appreciate it when it returns.

The crosses are not taken away completely. They are not removed. They are covered. We can see outlines of the crucifixes, but their beauty and details are fuzzy. This symbolizes the reality that our grief prevents us from seeing clearly until the Good Friday liturgy and, of course, Easter. This also reminds us of Our Lord's actions in response to the violence of the people in the *Judica* Gospel Lesson, the Lord "Jesus hid Himself." That is why the crosses and statues are veiled for *Judica*.

The idea of removing the *Gloria Patri* is much the same. The Triune Name given at the Ascension is the fullest revelation of God's Name given to men. To take away the *Gloria Patri* for two weeks is a bit jarring. It is particularly awkward not to sing it at the end of the *Nunc Dimitis*. Its short-term removal serves to draw our attention to it.

All of this is so that we would learn to mortify the flesh and to depend more and more upon the grace of God in Christ. For never, even in our most somber of ceremonies, is the Church in doubt about the end. Jesus died but is not dead. Jesus lives. Easter is coming. Our Hallelujahs, Gloria Patris, crosses, fatty foods, and the like shall all return, but even better than that, we shall have them forever in eternal paradise when our own resurrections occur.

Passiontide extends through Holy Week and the *Triduum* ("three holy days"—which includes Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday). At the conclusion of the Maundy Thursday Service the Altar will be stripped, the Sanctuary decorations, such as the candelabra, will be removed. Even the processional crucifix will be carried out., only to be carried back in during the reproaches on Good Friday. All that will be left in the Sanctuary are the immovable pieces of furniture, laid bare. On Good Friday and the Easter Vigil, while all is bare, the normal responses and introductions are removed from the readings.

The intensity builds from now until Holy Saturday when we finally arrive at the empty tomb but not at an empty Altar.


