Service Schedule Moving Forward

After receiving and considering input from the attendees of the 3:00pm Sunday Service, the board of elders has made the decision to discontinue that service after Palm Sunday.

On Palm Sunday, April 10, we will have the 9:00am service and the 3:00pm service. We will then follow our normal Holy Week schedule with Vespers at 7:00pm on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday; Holy Thursday Divine Service at 7:00pm; Good Friday Divine Service at 7:00pm; and Easter Vigil Divine Service at 8:00pm on Saturday. Easter Sunday, April 17, we will have Divine Service at 8:00am and 10:30am with breakfast served between services. On Sunday, April 24, we will return to one Divine Service at 9:00am.

As we return to meeting as one family under one roof at one time, please do try to be mindful of the fact that not everyone is at the same level of comfort. While there is no mask mandate, those who desire to wear them are certainly free to do so. Please endeavor to be sensitive to the needs and the cues of your brothers and sisters in Christ. If someone seems to desire a little extra space or if he specifically asks for it, please be courteous and allow extra space. Some of the changes we've put in place are likely permanent, while others will be going away little by little. As the transition back to 'normal' continues, please extend to one another the grace which befits brothers and sisters in Christ.

The Ceremonies of Passiontide

The final stage in our symbolic journey toward Easter (the journey which began back on *Septuagesima*) is Passiontide, which begins with *Judica*, the fifth Sunday in Lent. Passiontide is the 'home stretch,' the final push and most rigorous portion of the Lenten fast. This is why *Laetare*, the fourth Sunday in Lent has a slightly different character.

During Passiontide, the crucifixes and crosses are now covered, triptychs are closed (in churches which employ triptychs), and even the *Gloria Patri* disappears for a while.

A common question about Passiontide is "Why in the world would we drape and cover the crucifixes and crosses as we get closer to Good Friday, as our attention upon the last hours and the sufferings of our Lord increases?"

We do this because we don't deserve to look upon the crucifix. We are not worthy of the Sacrifice. Christ on the cross is our greatest and most cherished symbol. So it is partially taken away from us for a short time, that we might better appreciate it when it returns.

The crosses are not taken away completely. They are not removed. They are covered. We can see outlines of the crucifixes, but their beauty and details are fuzzy. This symbolizes the reality that our grief prevents us from seeing clearly until the Good Friday liturgy and, of course, Easter. This also reminds us of Our Lord's actions in response to the violence of the people in the *Judica* Gospel Lesson, the Lord "Jesus hid Himself." That is why the crosses and statues are veiled for *Judica*.

The idea of removing the *Gloria Patri* is much the same. The Triune Name given at the Ascension is the fullest revelation of God's Name given to men. To take away the *Gloria Patri* for two weeks is a bit jarring. It is particularly awkward not to sing it at the end of the *Nunc Dimitis*. Its short-term removal serves to draw our attention to it.

All of this is so that we would learn to mortify the flesh and to depend more and more upon the grace of God in Christ. For never, even in our most somber of ceremonies, is the Church in doubt about the end. Jesus died but is not dead. Jesus lives. Easter is coming. Our Hallelujahs, Gloria Patris, crosses, fatty foods, and the like shall all return, but even better than that, we shall have them forever in eternal paradise when our own resurrections occur.

Passiontide extends through Holy Week and the *Triduum* ("three holy days"—which includes Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday). At the conclusion of the Maundy Thursday Service the Altar will be stripped, the Sanctuary decorations, such as the candelabra, will be removed. Even the processional crucifix will be carried out. All that will be left in the Sanctuary are the immovable pieces of furniture, laid bare. On Good Friday and the Easter Vigil, while all is bare, the normal responses and introductions are removed from the readings.

The intensity builds from now until Holy Saturday when we finally arrive at the empty tomb but not at an empty Altar.

Holy Week Services Explained

(adapted mostly from the notes on the various services in <u>Lutheran Service Book: Altar Book</u> © 2006 CPH)

Holy Week is the culmination the preparatory time of Lent. It is a week of reflective meditation on the events of Jesus' life from His entrance into Jerusalem until His glorious resurrection from the dead.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday / Sunday of the Passion. The service of Passion Sunday, beginning with the procession of palms, reflects the contrasting attitudes toward Jesus which were on display during the days leading up to His crucifixion. "Palm Sunday" is named after the palms which were spread before Jesus as He entered Jerusalem. Palms are an ancient symbol of victory. The acclamation of the people, "Hosanna to the Son of David. Blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord," clearly reveals that they hailed Jesus as the messianic king. Yet only days later, our Lord would hear the cry "Crucify!" This contrast is reflected on this day as the joy of His triumphal entry into Jerusalem gives way to the somber remembrance of His passion. The reading of the passion narrative sets before the faithful all that our Lord did on our behalf. Thus is the Church prepared to enter Holy Week—the most important week of the entire Church

On Holy Monday through Holy Wednesday, we gather nightly to pray and meditate on our Lord's Passion using the ancient prayer office of Vespers.

On Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday), the Church gives thanks for the institution of the Lord's Supper. This service occurring on the eve of our Lord's crucifixion, begins the celebration of the holy three days of Christ's Passover commonly known as the **Triduum**. The service on this day culminates the Lenten period of preparation for Christ's Passion and Resurrection and leads into His Sacrifice on our behalf. As such, the service, like that for Good Friday, exhibits a mood of restrained joy. The service for Holy Thursday consists of four parts: the Service of Corporate Confession and Absolution; the Service of the Word; the Service of the Sacrament; and the Stripping of the Altar. On Holy Thursday, the Church and her catechumens begin the journey through the three days of Christ's Passover from death to life and from captivity to freedom. Since Holy Thursday serves as a point of transition from the preparatory season of Lent to the Triduum, restrained joy is characteristic of this service. It is a simplified and reflective celebration of the Divine Service. As a result, various aspects of the Divine Service are omitted on this day. Because the Triduum is seen as **one service in three parts**, no Benediction is spoken at the conclusion of the Holy Thursday service. The Benediction spoken at the Easter Vigil concludes all the services of the Three Days.

Good Friday is the second part of the sacred Triduum, the three-day observance of Christ's Passover. Good Friday is the most solemn of all days in the Christian Church, yet a note of joy remains, as the title of the day indicates. Good Friday is not observed as a funeral for Christ. It is a day for repentance over sin and restrained joy and praise for the redemption Christ accomplished for us on the cross. In keeping with this character, music is kept to a minimum, though not silenced. Elaborate words of praise are omitted and the altar remains sparsely adorned having been stripped on Holy Thursday. On Good Friday, as we remember that on account of our sin, the Lord was crucified and died, we give joyful thanks to God that all sin and God's wrath over sin falls on Jesus and not on us, and that by His grace we receive the benefit of this most sacrificial act. Given the solemnity of the day, silence is observed at various times in order to reflect upon the Word of God. Because the service is part of the **Triduum**, it has neither entrance rite nor benediction. The concluding hymn ensures that the final note of the service is one of triumph, for God's faithful know the end of the story.

The Vigil of Easter, celebrated at the end of Holy Saturday is the conclusion of the sacred Triduum. This service ushers in the celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord on Easter Sunday. The Easter Vigil connects the days of Holy Week, especially Holy Thursday and Good Friday, with the culminating celebration of the resurrection of Christ from the dead. It takes its name from the ancient practice of holding vigil, "keeping watch" through the night in expectation of Christ's return. As a service of watching which ushers in the resurrection, the Vigil of Easter is comprised of several parts: the Service of Light (including a fire and procession with candles); the Service

of Readings; the Service of Holy Baptism; the Service of Prayer; and the Service of the Word. Because the Vigil of Easter marks the final day in the sacred **Triduum**, the service ends with the Benediction, which has not been heard since the beginning of the **Triduum**, and the **Easter Acclamation:** "Christ is Risen!"

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Easter is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior! Easter is not merely one day. It is a whole season which also includes the celebration of Jesus' ascension. The fifty-day celebration from Easter to Pentecost is a week of weeks. The season's length is fitting because we dedicate one seventh of the year to celebration the Lord's resurrection.

Margaret Will Celebrate Her 102nd Birthday, May 2nd




