Catechesis Notes for the Week— The Table of Duties Concerning Wives and Husbands—The passages of Holy Scripture in the Table of Duties concern the offices we have been given as Christians where our faith in Christ is lived out in this world. There is often great confusion about these two holy offices. Husbands are the head of their wives, but their headship is one of sacrificial love, teaching the Word of God, and forgiving sin. They are to be considerate of their wives who are placed in an office that requires them to submit to their husbands. Husbands are not to lord their authority over their wives. This is always a temptation for any Christian husband. Wives are to understand that their office of submission is patterned after Christ's bride the Church. They are to expect their husbands to love them, teach them, and forgive them. Their beauty is not in outward adornment, but in the reception of their husband's love. "This is the way the holy women of the past who put their hope in God used to make themselves beautiful. They were submissive to their own husbands..." It is a beautiful and blessed thing when husbands love their wives as Christ loved the Church and when wives receive that love and trust in it.


# The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Ezekiel 34:11-16: The seeking Shepherd is a vivid description of the ministry of our Lord in both His death and the ongoing proclamation of His Word. He sought us who were in bondage to sin and death from which we could not set ourselves free. He came after us. He was born of the Virgin. He suffered under Pontius Pilate. He bore our sins in His body upon the tree. He loved us when we were quite unlovely. And He rose from the dead proclaiming forgiveness of sins. It is by this Word of forgiveness that He continues to seek us out, rescuing us from condemnation and a bad conscience, and giving us life.

1 Peter 2:21-25: The "example" or pattern of Christ's sufferings is that He committed Himself to the Father who judges righteously. The Father would not turn away from the flock that had been justified by Jesus' blood. By Christ's "stripes we are healed," for it was the Father that "laid on Him the iniquity of us all" (Isaiah 53), that we might be declared righteous. The Lord Jesus entrusted Himself in His sacrificial death "to Him who judges righteously." The pattern of faith that we follow is the same. In the face of our own sin and that which is laid upon us from others, we cast ourselves upon the judgment of the Father who declares us righteous for Jesus' sake.

John 10:11-16: A hireling does not care for the sheep as the Good Shepherd does, but rather flees when he sees the wolf coming. The wolf is Satan. He attacks us by using our sin against us. We have no defense in ourselves. But we have a Good Shepherd. He stood up to the devil by laying down his life on our behalf. The devil was out for blood. He demanded that blood be shed because of sin. Jesus was the only One who could make atonement for our sin. He loved us to the point of laying down His life for us. The flock of Christ is kept safe solely by the forgiveness of sins which is ours in the Good Shepherd. The ministry of every pastor is to be patterned after the ministry of our Lord. As he loved us and laid down his life for our forgiveness, so pastors are to love their flocks and lay down their lives, so to speak, for the cause of proclaiming that Word of forgiveness that sets them free.
